#### Rent-by-the-Bed

We have added 7 beds in the SW corner of the garden nearest the dog park and eco bins. This is a pilot program. If it goes well, we plan to add more beds.

#### Mentorship

## Feature Article

### Water Conservation

Small changes we make can create big changes for our community

- MCGA Annual Water bill is approx. \$12,000.The water is turned on generally from May 1 to
- Oct. 31 but is controlled by King County.
- ♦Check hoses and gaskets for leaks.
- ♦Be sure to always **turn off water after use**.
- ♦NO **automatic** drip lines/hoses are allowed.
- •The water pump recycles at roughly 10am, 2pm and 6pm and the water goes off for about 2-3 minutes. The water turns off daily at 10pm and comes on at 6am.
- ♦Please be conservative with your water use.

### Follow our Food Bank

The Food Bank (FB) committee plans crops according to the seasons, the hardiness of the plants and most importantly the needs of the HopeLink community that we serve.

For example, so far the food bank has planted onions, beets, broccoli, spinach, leeks, potatoes, radishes and cilantro. We can look forward to planting our scrumptious summer crops such as lettuce, squash, beans, tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, swiss chard and tomatillos. Just thought we'd share some spring season planting ideas with you. More to come!

## Spring Reminders

- Let's get those beds ready to plant! If you haven't already, remove the straw and you can either recycle it in the far back SE corner of the garden or place it in the "CLEAN GREEN BIN" in the front.
- IMPORTANT! Please do not put anything in the CLEAN GREEN BIN that is not organic matter. We have found plastic and metal objects in it already. There is a dumpster just to the left for all the garbage.
- Remember our garden is Organic and we must **not** use inorganic soils, amendments or fertilizer such as Miracle Gro. Organic Sluggo is acceptable.
- Wheelbarrows should be returned to the front of the garden and placed on the left side of the entry walkway. Those needing repair should be placed on the right side of the entry walkway. (Signage to come!)
- June 1 is the deadline for plot cultivation. This means that your plot should be weeded and planted.
